

THE TURTON FAMILIES OF BARTON STACEY, HAMPSHIRE, from 1750

This surname is spelt in two ways in the 18th century parish register of All Saints', Barton Stacey - Turten and Turton. The Turtons of the parish of Longparish married into families in Barton Stacey but first we look at Edward Turten of Wherwell parish.

EDWARD TURTEN of Wherwell parish married Sarah Hinxman of Barton Stacey parish on 30 September 1750. She was baptised on 2 November 1733 at Barton Stacey, daughter of John Hinxman junior and his second wife Joan, of Newton Stacey.

Edward Turton was buried in Barton Stacey churchyard on 16 August 1795, his wife on 3 December 1805.

Children of Edward and Sarah (Hinxman) Turton, baptised at Barton Stacey,

- i. Hannah, baptised 31 December 1758. She married Robert North (c.1745-1795), a maltster in Barton Stacey village, on 11 October 1775 at Barton Stacey. Their son William North and his sisters Sarah North and Hannah North were living at the time of the first census in 1841 at the house next to All Saints' Church, Barton Stacey, where William was the maltster. Hannah North died a widow aged 69 and was buried at Barton Stacey on 5 May 1827 (grave no. 37) in the same grave as her son Charles.
- ii. Magdalen, baptised 27 April 1760. Nothing further presently known of Magdalen or her sister Sarah.
- iii. Sarah, baptised 23 July 1763.
- iv. Joshua, baptised 23 February 1771. He was perhaps the Joshua Turton who married Sarah Briant in Chilbolton on 28 April 1791. Joshua Turton died aged 56 and was buried at Ampport, Hampshire on 22 June 1827.
- v. Lucy, baptised 13 June 1779. She married William Tarrant on 2 February 1797 at Barton Stacey. They were living at the time of the 1841 in Barton Stacey village. She was the teacher for the 12 children whose education was paid for by the Wright Charity fund. She died in 1855 aged 76.

RICHARD TURTON married Mary Hall at Longparish on 21 November 1759.

Children of Richard and Mary (Hall) Turton, baptised at Longparish,

- i. William, baptised 3 Feb 1761.

- ii. **THOMAS**, baptised 7 May 1769. He married Mary Willis on 26 July 1790 at Longparish.

Three of their children seem to have lived, at least for a time, in Barton Stacey parish. He died in Longparish in 1856 aged 86.

Children of Thomas and Mary (Willis) Turton, baptised at Longparish,

- i. **WILLIAM**, baptised 31 Mar 1793. He married Ann ___?___. The Hampshire Chronicle of 11 October 1830 reported the appointment of William Turton, presumably this man, as gamekeeper to Sir Henry Wright Wilson (Lord of the Manor of Barton Stacey).
 - i. Thomas, baptised 19 February 1826.
 - ii. Ann, baptised 24 May 1795.
 - iii. Henry, baptised 27 Aug 1797. He died aged 36 and was buried at Barton Stacey on 6 July 1834.
 - iv. Mary, baptised 8 Dec 1799.
 - v. Elizabeth, baptised 28 Feb 1802.
 - vi. **THOMAS**, baptised 30 Mar 1806. He was a Grenadier Guard between 1825 and 1840. At the time of the 1841 census, he was living on an army pension, in a cottage on the northern edge of Barton Stacey parish, located in the Drayton Park grounds.
He married Hannah Mills in 1845. She was a daughter of William and Elizabeth (Paice) Mills, baptised 31 December 1820 at Barton Stacey, and also known as Hannah Maria or Anna Maria.
Thomas Turton died in 1854 aged 47 and his widow married secondly John Barlow in 1862.

- iii. Elizabeth, baptised 17 Nov 1771.
 - iv. Richard, baptised 14 Aug 1774.
 - v. Mary, baptised 1 Mar 1778.
 - vi. Martha, baptised 29 Apr 1781.

NOTES

Mary Turton married Robert Anthony at Barton Stacey on 12 August 1771.

Hampshire Chronicle 23 August 1824. To be sold by auction on the premises at Moody's Down Farm, late in the occupation of Mr John Turton, under a distress for rent, eight ricks of excellent rye grass and hop clover seed. This farm was one of several which formed Barton Stacey manor.
